Chairperson's Report

Well, the past year has certainly been one out of the box! Who could ever have predicted the year Satisfy has had let alone what the entire world experienced? COVID-19 brought with it some significant challenges for Satisfy, but also some very unexpected positive outcomes. Since food rescue was classified as an essential service, we continued to operate through all the different lock down levels. The major challenge for us was that we had such an incredibly small space, so we could not achieve physical distancing for our staff and volunteers. The solution during Level 4 was to cut our operations to three days per week and for our Trustees to do the work in "family bubbles". When Level 3 rolled around, Stef and Helen came back on deck which was a huge help.

Even though we cut our operating days back, we were rescuing more food than ever, and I think this was due to a couple of things. Firstly, there was just more food to rescue. Hospitality was not operating, and households had stocked up (panic bought) before lockdown, but food was still being grown and produced and needed somewhere to go. Secondly, New Zealand suddenly had a heightened awareness of people in need, so food was being donated to food rescue organisations like never before!

The whole food rescue landscape has shifted due to COVID. The Ministry of Social Development (MSD) started funding food security initiatives mid-2020, which was the catalyst for a lot of change across the country. Their funding enabled the New Zealand Food Network (NZFN) to get up and running and the Aotearoa Food Rescue Alliance (AFRA) to form. Locally, Food Secure North Canterbury came together and secured a significant amount of funding from MSD with Satisfy as the fund holder.

To add to our regular grants from The Rata Foundation, Lotteries Communities Fund and COGS, we also received generous unsolicited donations from Foodstuffs (New World and PAK'nSAVE) and Countdown. Life Health Foods/Naked Cuisine also approached us to collaborate with them for a new "Local Heroes" soup range. For every pouch sold of their "Lentil, Potato & Caramelised Onion" soup Satisfy receives 20c.

What did all this mean for Satisfy? Well, where do I start?

- We were able to move into new premises at the end of October – which means we can receive pallets of goods without storing them down the Darnley Club corridor, and our volunteers can work without falling over each other! We also now have a walk-in freezer which means we can receive bulk frozen food too. Our opening celebration in November was fantastic. Thanks to everyone who joined us to make it such a success!

- We hired Cameron Crawley as our Operations Coordinator in October and Stef Van Meer stepped up to be our manager.
- We have become a food hub for NZFN which means we are regularly receiving bulk food by the pallet load, with the frequency of deliveries increasing after they opened their Christchurch branch in March.
- We partnered with the Oxford & District Lions club late last year. They generously planted potatoes, pumpkins, beetroot, courgettes and corn, harvesting over 10 tonnes of food for Satisfy, which is still coming! They are planning to plant even more this Spring.
- We also partnered with Rotary Club of Belfast who purchased seconds of potatoes, carrots, onions and pumpkins. This partnership has continued into this Winter.
- Satisfy joined AFRA and attended the founding hui in March along with 18 other New Zealand food rescue organisations.
- Satisfy is an integral part of the new Food Secure North Canterbury group, along with other key stakeholders; local foodbanks (Kaiapoi Community Pantry, Oxford Community Trust, Salvation Army, Hope Community Trust) Kaiapoi Food Forest, Kaiapoi Community Garden, Waimakariri District Council and Hurunui District Council, which has the goal that all people at all times should have access to sufficient, safe and nutritious food, to create food security in the Waimakariri and Hurunui Districts.
- We are working with Waimakariri District Council and two other community groups, Kaiapoi Menz Shed and Kaiapoi Croquet Club, to establish a Kaiapoi Community Hub where Satisfy will have a purpose-built facility.
- We are also working with Hurunui District Council to explore opportunities for a hub for Satisfy in Amberley.

Our valuable and constant Board of Trustees was joined by Brian Thompson in late March. Brian brings with him a wealth of experience, not only from his experience in governance, but also his strong financial management, HR and health and safety experience.

A massive thank you to our amazing team of volunteers, our fantastic staff and our wonderful Trustees. Satisfy couldn't happen without your valuable contribution!

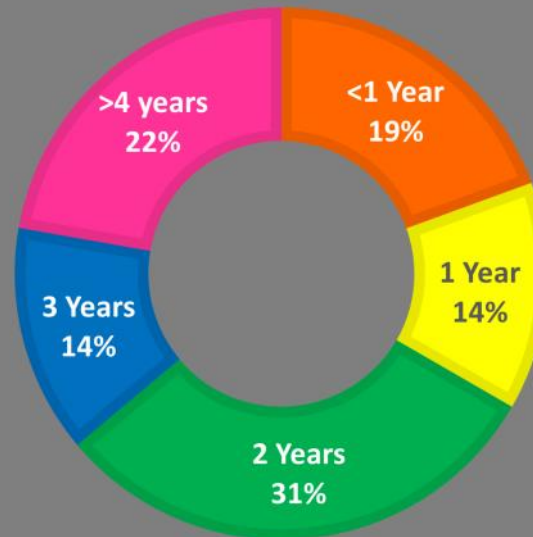

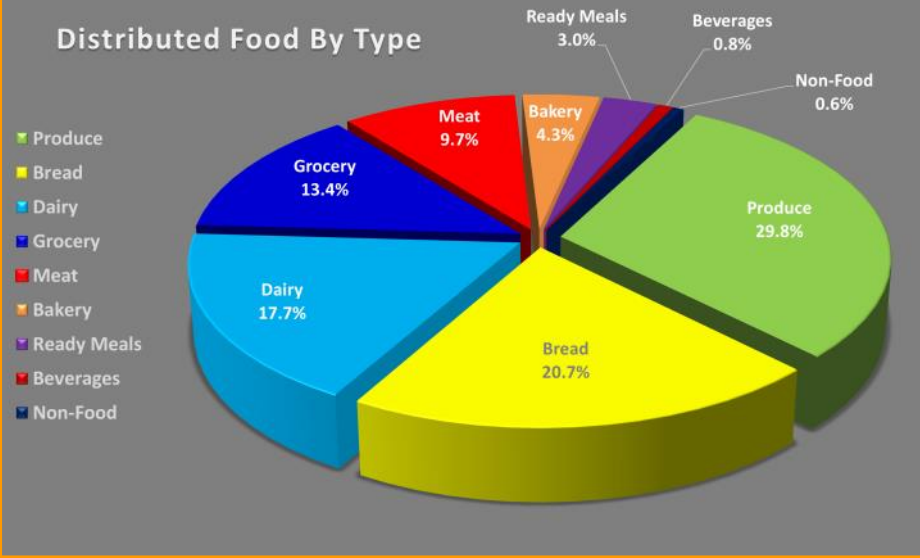
Satisfy Food Rescue Yearly Data



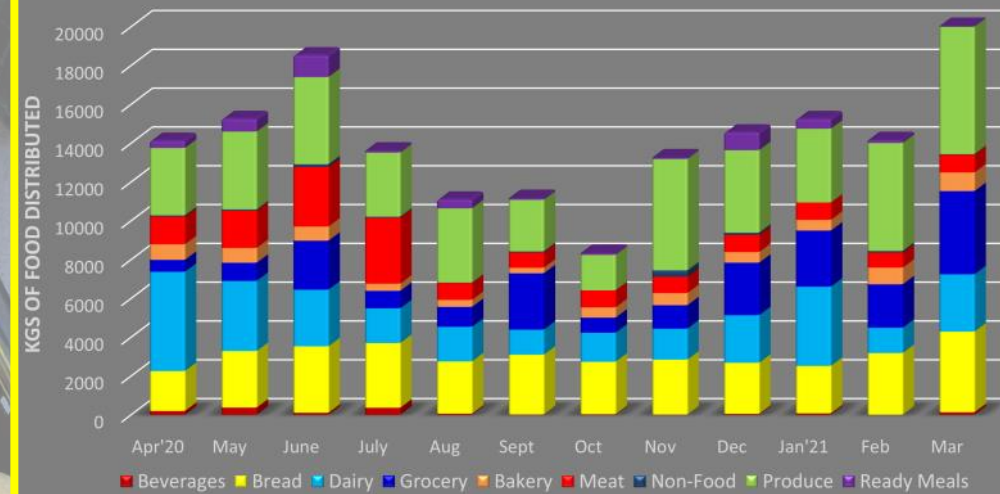
Equivalent Meals Distributed 2020/21
